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Annual Report of the ISAP Co-presidents 2013

For ISAP last year, 2013, was a year of many decisions.

First of all at our participant meetings we debated many controversial ideas concerning the Swiss accreditation of our training program. In the fall we were able to come to a synthesis of opposing views and decided to have the classical analytical program include the accredited program. The classical analytical program integrates the federal requirements. In this regard we clearly distinguish ourselves from most of the other psychotherapy institutes because of our higher requirements. This is particularly the case regarding the number of hours of training analysis. For us training analysis is the core of the program.

In 2013 ISAP had more contact with the C.G. Jung Institute. On April 20th there was a large meeting with the Austrian, Friedrich Glasl, as moderator (40 from ISAPZURICH; 30 from CGJI) in which various ideas concerning a possible rapprochement were discussed. The 'initiative group' (4 from ISAPZURICH; 4 from CGJI), as well as other analysts, met four times thereafter in order to analyze these ideas and projects and assess their feasibility, particularly with regard to the emotions, structures, identity and finances of the two institutes. Three reports on these efforts were sent to the analysts. In addition a symposium has been organized by the emotions group together with the SGAP for January 25, 2014. It will address the emotions of the past and attempt to process them.

In 2013 the AGAP ExCo concluded a year-long process to formulate the criteria for AGAP membership. Initially three representatives from each group (CGJI, ISAPZURICH and AGAP) tried to find a solution to the controversy. Some agreement was reached but the unresolved issues were sent back to the AGAP ExCo. The AGAP ExCo then proposed criteria and sent them to the CGJI and ISAPZURICH for feedback. Thereafter the AGAP Membership Convention was included in the agenda for the triennial AGAP General Assembly in Copenhagen in August 2013. The Membership Convention is a compromise between the requirements of both institutes and has the traditional training program as the basis for becoming an analyst.

In 2013 ISAPZURICH decided to move to new premises. The ISAP Council had been told to consider leaving Hochstrasse. In the fall of 2013 we found a building with large, well-lit rooms that wonderfully corresponded to our needs. After almost 10 years we left Hochstrasse, the site which served the establishment of ISAPZURICH. Since January 1, 2014, we have settled in at Stampfenbachstrasse 115, an Art Nouveau building built in 1911 and under historic protection. Nearby there is a park with old trees and a view over the city of Zurich. We are very content with this change.

The loyalty of our participants and the energy of our committee members is greatly appreciated by the ISAP Council and make it possible for the ISAPZURICH ship to move forward from the somewhat turbulent waters of 2013. For this high level of dedication we of the ISAPZURICH Council want to thank you.

We would also like to thank our parent organization, AGAP. The two co-presidents, Stacy Wirth and John Desteian, and the entire Executive Committee of AGAP have accompanied and supported ISAPZURICH with great care and dedication. Since August 2013 Josephine Evetts-Secker has taken over the presidency. We wish her all the best and look forward to fruitful collaboration.

Since 2012 Susanne Chapuis has been the Director of Operations at ISAPZURICH. She has proved to be extremely competent and farsighted, and has helped the ISAPZURICH Council in multiple capacities, introducing new ideas and executing them efficiently. We would like to express our wholehearted thanks to her and the entire staff for their achievements.

The ISAPZURICH students continue to be very active and contribute interesting ideas. Through the student representatives they have suggested that ISAPZURICH set up an out-patient clinic. We intend to undertake this project later this year. With the help of the student representatives as well as in direct contact with the students, information concerning the various challenges and developments at ISAP has been timely and transparent.



ISAPZURICH's regular program and special presentations (the Jungian Odyssey, the Märztagung and the Zurich Lecture Series) were remarkably successful. We thank the organizers most warmly for their work. The Jungian Odyssey, entitled "Echoes of Silence, Listening to Soul, Self and Other", along with the retreat, was once again fully booked. It was held at Kartause Ittingen with the poet David Whyte and the Jungian, Lionel Corbett. A now internationally known conference, the Zurich Lecture Series, takes place in October.

Toshio Kawai spoke on "Haruki Murakami and Japanese Medieval stories: Between Pre-Modern and Postmodern World." The Zurich Lecture Series is the result of cooperation between ISAPZURICH and Spring Journal Books, New Orleans. We would like particularly to thank Nancy Cater for her engagement without which this conference would not be possible. With the Märztagung ISAPZURICH presents itself to the German-speaking population. The brilliant lectures and workshops on the theme of "Family: Fate or Choice" was enthusiastically received by the large number of people attending.

Special mention must be made of our own in-house troupe of actors: John Hill, Paul Brutsche, Dariane Pictet and Murray Stein. They portrayed the essential contents of the Red Book in dramatic style on stage. They toured widely in 2013, including China, Taiwan and St. Petersburg. We congratulate them most warmly.

The Future:

We co-presidents and the entire IC are pleased with the challenges and tasks in store for us in 2014. We have had two days of strategic planning in which we discussed at length the opportunities and risks for ISAPZURICH going forward at this time. As in the past we stand for the traditional training of analysts because we believe that analysts, who move forward in self awareness, are the most able to further individuation in the postmodern person. We have a deep respect for the uniqueness of each person and consider the search for meaning and self-fulfillment important in these times.

Jungian Odyssey



"It is rewarding to watch patiently the silent happenings of the soul, and the most and best happens when it is not regulated from outside and above." CG Jung, CW12, §126 (1944/1968)

2013 marks the first year thus far in which the Jungian Odyssey took place not amidst breath-taking mountain peaks, but in the rural valleys of Thurgau, some 50 kilometers from Jung's birthplace, Kesswil. Despite our initial qualms about the shared appeal of the lowlands, the 12th century Kartause Ittingen emerged to be an ideal and cherished temenos for the exploration of

our topic, *Echoes of Silence: Listening to Soul, Self, Other*. Counting ISAP students, visitors, and presenters, 84 people attended, representing 24 different countries—some as distant as Mexico, Venezuela, South Africa, New Zealand, Japan, Taiwan, China. For reasons not entirely known to us, this Odyssey attracted an unusually large number of AGAP members, whom we were delighted to see along with many JO "veterans" and new faces.

After a greeting by co-president Marco Della Chiesa, Ursula Wirtz extended a warm welcome and introduction to the place and *genius loci*. Wryly noting the paradox of a week devoted to talking about silence, she invoked our ability to "listen when silence speaks, to echo in our hearts the silenced voices of the oppressed, to not become silent about what truly matters to us." We were honored to welcome the poet David Whyte (UK, USA) as keynote speaker and the renowned Jungian analyst Lionel Corbett (USA) as our special guest. The week's rich offering of lectures, seminars and experiential workshops deepened a range of meanings from the need for more noise, to silence as conspiracy, to silence as a creative source and salve for the soul in a world brimming with distractions.

A memorable excursion took us to the historic old town of St. Gallen, where we toured the Cathedral, the Abbey, and the Abbey library. Yet in keeping with the *genius loci*, we remained cloistered on the tranquil monastery grounds to enjoy a number of special events: a tour of the monks' cells and gardens, a book launch amidst lush roses, a solo concert by the flutist Heironymous Schädler in the Baroque church, and meditative music played on the piano by Vreni Bollag. Not last, a sudden and wild thunderstorm swept through our fondue night at the forest's edge—rewarding those who braved it out with a full rainbow shimmering against a quiet, eerily lit evening sky. The traditional gala farewell dinner was topped off with dancing to the music of two young up-and-coming DJs, Catherine Egger and Nadja Staub.

At this writing we look forward to Spring's publication of the lectures in the *Jungian Odyssey Series Vol. VI*—and also to the Jungian Odyssey in May 2014, *The Crucible of Failure*, at the Romantik Hotel Schweizerhof in Grindelwald. At the same time we are almost ready to reveal to you our plans for JO 2015 and invite your contributions!
