Well we did it! We have completed a second year of training under varying pandemic restrictions with remarkable success. It is difficult to remember all the ups and downs of this topsy-turvy year, but it is important to try, so that we do not forget our suffering and our resilience, the costs and rewards of going through tough times together and the coming out on the 'other side' a new, transformed, community. During the Spring Semester many courses had to be moved to 'Zoom only', due to the constantly changing governmental restrictions in place at the time. In addition, many special events, like Märztagung and the Jungian Odyssey had to be postponed due to the restrictions. The Jungian Odyssey committee, however, graciously created an 'Odyssey Bridge', which will be detailed elsewhere in the Annual Report. Despite creative efforts, we all felt the burden of uncertainty as to how things would develop throughout the entire semester. But with patience and great support from our staff, teachers and students, we got through it quite well.

Vaccines became more widely available in the spring, which brought a surge of interest in ISAP and we began the Autumn Semester with a record fifteen new students joining our fully 'on site' (again) training. And a full semester it was: all classes were in person and filled to capacity; ZLS (Zurich Lecture Series) took place at ISAP in an adapted form with a full audience on site as well as good Zoom attendance; social events celebrating our elders (Peter Ammann's 90th birthday and

Andrew Fellows stepped in as new Program Director in April 2021 with aplomb, dedication, inspiration, tenacity, skill and a great sense of (British) humor. Autumn Semester 2021 was his first whole semester at the head of this central part of ISAP's existence: it's teaching program, and we are very grateful for his leadership and service.

Yuriko Sato took over the chairmanship of the Studies (International Program) area, also in April 2021, after effectively doing the job in the background for some time. We are very grateful to have her quiet, steady, caring, attentive and knowledgeable presence at the helm of this crucial area of the training. She joins Lucienne Marguerat, Director of the CH (Swiss) Program at ISAP, in co-leading this fundamental aspect of ISAP.

Lucienne has also assumed the role of Co-Chair of Admissions and she will take over in 2022 as Director of Admissions, when Ursula Ulmer steps down. There had to be some further shifting of roles within the IC as we managed missing positions (Secretary and Treasurer) while carrying out

the work implementing ISAP. I am extremely grateful to all the IC members for their flexibility, adaptability and untiring dedication. They are a great team leading ISAP!

At the beginning of 2021 we found new outside Consultants to replace Jana Sepps in the experienced persons of Helene Inderbitzin and Luzia Fischer, Helene is a retired Human Resources expert and has been instrumental in helping the IC and Staff create better and more efficient ways of evaluation and communication. She will also take over the payroll work from Credit Suisse, making it more efficiently 'in house'. Luzia is a Swiss fiduciary (Treuhänderin), mainly responsible for supporting the IC with year-end official statements, setting up the annual budget and working with accounting, bookkeeping and all our many financial details. We are very happy to have these two ladies working for ISAP and they have been particularly helpful during this year when the IC was without a treasurer.

JITZ's financial support for a variety of projects was again crucial during the second year of the pandemic since we continued to see loss of income from cancelled major events and no visiting outside groups. In addition, the generous donations from ISAP Participants ranging from time investment, to point donations, and donations in kind as well as in cash, have not only helped gird up our financial bottom line, they also fill our hearts with joy and gratitude.

It has been an amazing year and ISAP has come through the turbulence more resilient and even more committed to its mission of full-time inperson training.





### **Admissions Committee**

#### **Ursula Ulmer**

2021 marked the third and fourth semester of struggling with the consequences of Covid. Applicant interviews with the AC members were often online and accessing the analytical skill of diploma candidates working with clients online (sometimes exclusively) was difficult. But the number of accepted applicants held steady in the Spring Semester and then surged astonishingly in the Autumn Semester with 15 new students. We still are not sure why this happened but suspect that people are weary of online learning and will do a lot to find in person community learning. Over the course of 2021 the number of training

and diploma candidates rose from 46 to 55. Most significant in 2021 is that Lucienne Marguerat joined me as co-director of the AC and is willing stand for Director of Admissions in 2022 when I step down. I could not feel more confident about leaving this committee in such excellent hands. It has been a pleasure to have her with me in this complicated job, even while she maintains other significant ISAP positions. I am deeply grateful. It was a difficult but most encouraging year for the AC.

# Re-accreditation Report

ISAP will decide whether or not to apply for reaccreditation at the Participant Assembly on March 26, 2022. Preparations for that process have already been underway however, since the renewed application requires again a submission of a complete dossier to BAG that meets the, in the meantime, revised quality requirements. In order to be prepared in case the application for reaccreditation is approved by ISAP participants, we have started along with 4 other training institutes of ASP to search for suitable, proven evaluation tests for therapies. The new quality requirements of BAG include namely the evaluation of the course, most of all of the success, of the therapeutic work conducted by Diploma Candidates.

#### CH program news

In 2021 we were able to award the first CH diploma. The graduate was awarded the title 'federally recognized psychotherapist' by BAG (EDI). She will decide later if she wants to fulfill the further requirement, essentially the diploma thesis, to become a Jungian analyst.

A new training candidate has joined the CH program and we are very happy to have again three candidates in the CH program.

# **AGAP Report**

# Co-Presidents: Josephine Evetts-Secker & Stacy Wirth

Again, due the pandemic in 2021, the AGAP ExCo was unable to gather for its customary meetings in Zürich. Each of its three ordinary meetings were held instead on Zoom, with ISAP President Deborah Egger attending regularly to report on ISAP news. We were impressed to learn about ISAP's continuing successful efforts to adapt to the pandemic situation. Several times, potential synergies between AGAP and ISAP were discussed.

In the spirit of synergy, the ExCo tentatively agreed that AGAP would take over the role that the Association of Swiss Psychotherapists (ASP) has served in the past—namely, the oversight of ISAP's CH-Program vis à vis the Swiss federal authority (BAG). The final agreement between AGAP and ISAP hinges on several factors, as agreed by a straw vote at the ISAP Participants Meeting in September 2021. Important to note here: The final agreement will depend on whether or not the ISAP Participants Assembly 2022 decides to continue with the accreditation project.

Much of 2021 was devoted to preparations for the Forum and GA, both of which were postponed to

# **Program Committee**

I formally took over from Nancy Krieger as Director of Program (I have succumbed to the American spelling) at our April 2021 Participants Assembly, and have been grateful for her guidance up a steep learning curve! There was also a major turnover of the Program Committee membership, with only Ann Chia-Yi Li and Galina Angelova carrying on from its previous incarnation. With the help of our new members Joanne Wieland-Burston, Jody Schlatter and Susanna Bucher, and later Dian Abdurachman (subject to ratification), we seem to have muddled through quite successfully. This has been thanks in no small part to continuing scheduling support from Martin Fischer and IT support from Axel Essbaum.


Spring Semester 2021 turned out to be a baptism by fire for all of us, with the BAG changing Covid restrictions to on-site attendance every three weeks, and to international travel unpredictably at short notice. This led to the worst disruptions yet, with almost a third of all courses moved at short notice to Zoom, but only three cancellations. We could never have managed this without Claire, Korine, Catherine McBroom, Axel and even our esteemed President stepping in to run Zoom, so my heartfelt thanks to all of them. Nonetheless, the ISAP building was at times reduced to a ghost town, and our resident students sorely missed inperson teaching. Likewise, many of us were fed up with being so isolated from one another, so in an attempt to revive our sense of community I instigated a virtual wine bar on the last Friday of each month throughout the semester—hardly part of the program, but sorely needed (if only by me!).

Autumn Semester 2021 was, despite the continuing pandemic, an enantiodromia—all teaching was on-site, and course attendance was swelled by an intake of fifteen new students. Stampfenbachstrasse 115 was now more like rush hour at Zürich HB, which brought a new set of challenges (be careful what you wish for!). The Program Committee listens carefully to feedback from our student representatives, who were concerned about the sometimes poor quality of discussion during seminars and after

lectures. This is a delicate matter, which requires good moderation by all presenters and a judicious balance between restricting seminar attendance to more advanced students while leaving sufficient opportunities open to all. We also heard about new students being admitted spontaneously to seminars ahead of others on the waiting list, which is unacceptable. These issues aside, the semester was a welcome return to ISAP's default mode of on-site teaching that was greatly appreciated by our students.

Like a microcosm of ISAP emulating CGJI when we were established, I began by following in Nancy's footsteps. I am beginning to establish my own way as I become more confident, as those of you who responded to my calls for proposals will realise. I have, with help from Jody Schlatter, comprehensively revised the corresponding Jotform to accommodate guest presenters as well as ISAP Participants; it also enforces strict word count limits, which may be unpopular with proposers but not with the Program Committee! I now forward all evaluations and feedback, however good, bad or unfair, to presenters as I trust your ability as analysts to cope with this.

My proposal to collaborate with the Pari Center in Tuscany on a pilot one-week residential course was overwhelmingly approved at our October Participants Meeting. We have been consolidating our ideas, and it will be on the theme of "Psyche and Time" from 14-20 June 2022 (immediately after the AGAP forum)—details to follow.



## **Zurich Lecture Series**

### **Murray Stein**

The annual Zurich Lecture Series in 2021 featured Prof. Roderick Main of Essex University (UK) on the topic: "The Undoing of Disenchantment: Mystery, Meaning, and Metaphysics in the Work of C.G. Jung". A book with the same title will be published in 2022 by Chiron Publications.

In his well-received Zurich Lectures, Prof. Main argued that Jung's work can be seen as a response to the condition of disenchantment that characterizes modernity. In addition, he discussed the topic of metaphysics in Jung's work, which would support a sense of re-enchantment and re-establish a relationship between sensible world and transcendent reality in the form of panentheism. He further argued that Jung's distinctive form of holistic thought is valuable not only for psychotherapy but can also serve as a constructive response to current social and environmental crises that have resulted from the prevalent attitude of disenchantment.

This year's attendance for the Series was around 66 on Friday and 57 on Saturday. Unfortunately, we could only accept a maximum of 40 participants on-site due to COVID-19 restrictions and measures.

The Postlude consisted of lectures by Brigitte Egger, Luis Moris, Scott William Hyder, and a panel discussion led by Murray Stein with panellists Dariane Pictet, Nathalie Boëthius-de Béthune, and Paul Brutsche. The Postlude took place over two days, live at ISAP and widely viewed on Zoom.



In addition, Margot Estabrook Stienstra led an excursion to Küsnacht for A Guided Tour of the Haus C.G. Jung Museum. It was attended by ISAP candidates and analysts who all expressed their appreciation and enjoyment during that sunny afternoon.

ZLS 2022 will feature Prof. Keiron Le Grice of Pacifica Graduate Institute, whose topic will be "The Cosmological Dimension of Individuation: Astrology and Alchemy as a Guide to Psychospiritual Transformation." The four lectures by Prof. Le Grice will again be followed by a Postlude, which will feature lectures by ISAP analysts and a Panel moderated by Murray Stein on the topic: "Fate and Destiny: A Jungian Perspective."

### Graduations

We were so glad that we could get together at ISAP to celebrate graduation both in Spring and Autumn Semester 2021. On 5 June, Stephanie Turin was awarded the "Diplom als eidg. anerkannte Psychotherapeutin". She was the first who has ever finished this part of the CH-Program. We sent her good wishes for her further training towards Diploma in Analytical Psychology. On 10 December by complying with 2G rules and by circulating the air vigorously every 45 minutes, we could celebrate the graduation of Kumiko

Yamane. She was the student resident at ISAP and always a reliable helper to make ISAP a secure, well attended house. We are very grateful to her for her help over years and wish her all the best in the future.

## **Picture Collection**

In April of 2021 the idea to create an ISAP Picture Collection was hatched. Paul Brutsche and Kathrin Schaeppi drafted a project plan including a budget, which was presented and welcomed at the annual Picture Department meeting in August. The basic aim of the project is to create an anonymized picture collection and database of materials from clients who have been in analysis with a therapist or analyst trained in the tradition of C.G. Jung's analytical psychology. The aim, in addition to securing the artistic creations in both material and electronic form, is to make such valuable material available to ISAPZURICH analysts and students for learning, teaching and research purposes.

The IC quickly approved the project with the stipulation that funding be found for it outside of ISAP's budget. And as in a benevolent fairy tale, 100'000CHF was anonymously pledged for its implementation and the first picture donation agreement was signed on September 20th, consisting of 45 drawings, 17 copies of drawings, 2 oil pastels and some photographs of 3-dimensional objects.

This quick progression was greeted with excitement and urgency to move forward with the practical aspects such as where to place a cabinet for the pictures, which electronic system to choose to catalogue the images, and who would be part of the working project team.

#### Budding of the ISAPZURICH Picture Collection

In December 2021 the first official meeting was held and the project team members who dared to lend their energy to this unique and momentous project were inaugurated: Paul and Kathrin as cochairs, Lucienne Marguerat as member and also as liaison to the IC, Barbara Jarrett and Carol McGinty as members and library experts -- for the Picture Collection is to be housed in the library and in S4. Axel Essbaum will field our technology questions and further administrative assistance will be acquired as needed.

The Picture Department sees the Picture Collection as a symbol of ISAP's creative potential; a bud that slowly opens spreading a vision that can nourish our visual senses. The team calls out soulfully for you to bequeath your picture material to ISAP to grow its collection.





### Research Circle

### **Christiana Ludwig**

"The Accreditation and Research" group began its work in Spring Semester 2021 under a new name: Research Circle. Isabelle Meier withdrew and Christian Ludwig took over the position of coordinator. Together with the established members (Paul Brutsche and Lucienne Marguerat), as well as with the consent of Peter Schulthess, the group focused on the conditions for ISAP's accreditation required by the Federal Department of Health (BAG). This led to creating the Research Circle with the purpose of discussing new research in theories and therapies relevant to Jungian concepts as well as interesting new publications (books and articles) by Jungians.

The meetings take place once near the end of each semester and are open to all analysts with no need for preparation or registration. Participation in English or German is welcome depending on who attends. One or more concepts are introduced and discussed together and a handout distributed.

The first meeting took place on June 21, 2021 on the topic was "Images of Illness in Flux: Perspectives on Schizophrenia and C.G. Jung. Due to the pandemic it was held online via Zoom. This exciting topic has a significant potential to change the diagnosis and therapy in the future and would relieve patients burdened by this discouraging label.

In the Autumn Semester 2021 we met in person and decided on the core concept of Archetype as the theme. We discussed Jung's work where he states various and controversial formulations for this concept.

For those interested, and who could not be present for our meeting, we later offered an online version.

These initial attempts and the feedback were encouraging and positive. We look forward to further meetings and good discussions.

# **Library Report**

The ISAP library was pleased to be able to continue services to ISAP analysts and students in 2021, despite pandemic limitations, and to keep improving the library collection. This our last year of access to a special library grant, and our ongoing exploration of different resources for research has led to more new subscriptions for the library, notably to the International Journal of Jungian Studies and Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy in China.

There were many new books on the library shelves in 2021, from Routledge, Chiron, and many other publishers. Another small but useful achievement was acquiring and cataloging extra copies of books important to ISAP students, by such scholars as Marie-Louise von Franz and Erich Neumann. With the larger-than-usual group of new students in autumn of 2021, this was invaluable.

We are also modestly expanding our bookshop



to include an increased number of used books in English. This service depends on book donations from Jungian analysts, and we were grateful to receive a few of these in 2021. It is helpful to ISAP students who are building their own Jungian book collections. We are looking forward to continuing with these activities and more, in an inspiring 2022!

# Practicum Internship

Depending on which program is chosen (CH, IPR, or IFT) ISAP training requires a minimum of a three-month internship in a psychiatric or psychosomatic clinic. This may take place worldwide, within an ambulatory or stationary context, part-time of full-time.

My task as co-ordinator and mentor involves several ways of supporting the candidates within the framework of their internship, helping them become more knowledgeable and discovering where and how they resonate with severe mental illnesses.

Candidates come to me often at the beginning of their training with questions concerning the basic role of the internship. This involves the entire process from finding a suitable institution, often by searching websites, to setting up an internship plan as well as with questions regarding credit for past internships. When institutions have provided a successful experience to candidates in the past, I try to connect our candidates for information. Recently there was a situation where

I was able to activate a private contact to provide potential liaisons for future internships in a rather uncommon country.

I am the contact person for questions that arise during an internship, which the institution itself may be not able to clarify.

After completion of an internship, I read the internship report and the evaluation submitted by the institution. That is a very rewarding part of the work because I seek out moments where a candidate was moved or shaken by the suffering of a patient as well as being able to contribute successfully to the therapeutic team.

As a conclusion I give the candidates my personal feedback and make suggestions concerning how to profit from further work in clinics, for example, exposure to a wider spectrum of mental illnesses, and I encourage them to go to different places and explore and learn about diverse institutions. Finally, I initiate the official approval of the internship by the Director of Studies.

# Wealth Management

#### Dariane Pictet (for the finance committee)

We are happy to report that we had another good year and we closed 2021 with a performance of 11.24%. January 2022 skies were quite stormy in the financial markets, with important market corrections. The portfolio declined 5% approximately, which reduced our gains of 2021 to 6.24% as the performance of the portfolio is mainly driven by equities. The plan is to weather this volatility with equanimity, with the hope that we will make up it up in the months to come.

We continue to be satisfied with PPT's management of the portfolio, which ended up 2021 with an asset allocation of 16% in cash, 18% in short-term debt with our microfinance fund managed by Blue Orchard, 7% in Gold, and 59% in global equities, in line with our goals of providing social

and environmental impact with each of our asset classes. As a reminder, Microfinance furthers social inclusion and women empowerment. Swiss Positive Gold, insures that we know where the gold comes from and that mining doesn't include child labor or untraceable 'dirty gold' but furthers social inclusion, reforestation and biodiversity. The Cadmos engagement fund is committed to human right, the environment, anti-corruption, and SDG's (Sustainable Development Goals). Lastly, the Enertia Energy Infrastructure fund supports CO2 emission reduction and energy transition.

Our strategy is not changing at this point and I will be reporting back in March at the AGM.
