Jungian Odyssey 2007 Presenters

Peter Ammann, PhD, having studied music (cello) and musicology, went on to train at the CG Jung Institute Zürich. He is now a training analyst and a lecturer at ISAPZURICH. He has a practice both in Zürich and Geneva and lectures regularly in Switzerland, South Africa and the UK. He is also a filmmaker. After working with Fellini in Rome he became an independent documentary filmmaker. His documentaries include "Hlonipa: Journey into Wilderness; Sandplay with Dora Kalff"; "Spirits of the Rocks".

Kathrin Asper, PhD was born in 1941 in Zurich. She studied literature and education, receiving her PhD in Literature on Gustave Flaubert, the French novelist. She trained at the CG Jung Institute, Zurich, has been in private practice since 1975 and has lectured worldwide. In addition to many publications in German, her publications in English include: "The Inner Child in Dreams"; "The Abandoned Child Within: On Loosing and Regaining Self-Worth". Her special areas of interest are narcissism and self-worth, problems connected with physical disability, trauma, as well as psychotherapeutic approaches and perspectives on fairy tales, literature and art.

Christopher Bamford, author, is the editor of SteinerBooks and Lindisfarne Books. A Fellow of the Lindisfarne Association, he has lectured, taught and written widely on Western spiritual traditions. He is the author, translator and editor of numerous books, including: "The Voice of the Eagle, Celtic Christianity: Ecology and Wholeness"; "Homage to Pythagoras; An Endless Trace". He also had an essay included in the *Harper Anthology of Best Spiritual Writing* 2000.

Maria Anna Bernasconi, lic. phil., has a degree in psychology, psychopathology and history of arts from the University of Zurich. Having graduated from the CG Jung Institute Zurich, she has worked as a psychotherapist for sev-

eral years together with a psychiatrist. She is a specialist for power-places in Switzerland and her other interests include European folklore, anthropology, prehistory, and expressive art therapies.

Linda Briendl, lic. phil., received her degree in psychology from the University of Zurich and her Diploma from the CG Institute in 1990. Formerly a graphic artist, she worked in a psychiatric hospital, was employed in a medical psychosomatic practice and has lectured at colleges for social professions. She has a private practice in Baden, is a training analyst at ISAPZURICH, and is president of the Susan Bach Foundation.

Raffaella Ada Colombo, MD (1988) specialized in psychiatry (1992) and graduated from CG Jung Institute Zurich (2003). Since 1988 she has been working in a Psychiatric Hospital near Milan and in private practice. As a psychiatrist she has published articles on epidemiology, psychopathology and psychopharmacology. At the psychiatric hospital she is involved in research on cognitive impairments of the prefrontal cortex in patients suffering from Bipolar Disorders. She is specifically interested in the relationship of mind and brain and the interdisciplinary study of neuroscience and analytical psychology, lecturing on these subjects at ISAPZURICH.

Marco Della Chiesa, Professor, is a sociologist and graduate of the CG Jung Institute Zurich. He is currently Director of Psychodrama at the Moreno Institute in Stuttgart, and a professor at the Polytechnic Institute of Northwest Switzerland. From 1998–2004 he served as president of the Swiss Society for Analytical Psychology (SGAP). He lives with his family in Mönchaltdorf, and conducts his private practice in Zurich.

Brigitte Egger, Dr.sc.nat.ETH in ecology, is a Jungian training analyst (graduated in 1997) and scientist. She has her practice in Zurich

and works in four languages. She concentrates her research on the psychic and symbolic dimension of collective phenomena which includes ecological issues of energy, water, predators, market globalization and works on introducing this dimension into the concrete environmental protection. She lectures and publishes regularly.

Deborah Egger, MSW, is a training analyst for ISAPZURICH. She maintains a private practice in Stäfa. She is president of AGAP and a member of the IAAP Executive Committee. Her professional areas of interest include adult development, transferential fields and spiritual growth. She is currently writing on the role of the couple in adult development.

Allan Guggenbühl, Prof., PhD, received his degrees from the University of Zurich in education and psychology and graduated from the CG Jung Institute Zurich in 1994. He is editor of the Jungian journal *Gorgo*, director of the Institute for Conflict Management in Bern and is well known for his methods of Mythodrama and Crisis intervention in various Swiss schools. He has many publications, including his celebrated *Men, Power and Myths*.

Gary Hayes, lic.phil., received his degree in literature and linguistics from the University of Zurich and his diploma in analytical psychology from the CG Jung Institute Zurich. He is presently a Training Analyst and director of the examination conference at ISAPZURICH. He maintains a private practice for psychotherapy in Zurich. His areas of professional interest include the psychology of the father, narcissism and dreams.

John Hill, MA received his degrees in philosophy at the University of Dublin and the Catholic University of America. He trained at the CG Jung Institute Zurich, has practiced as a Jungian analyst since 1973, and is a training analyst of ISAPZURICH. His publications include the following subjects: The Association Experiment, Celtic Myth, The Significance of Home, Dreams and Christian Mysticism.

James Hollis, PhD, was formerly a professor of humanities and graduated from the CG Jung Institute Zurich in 1982. He is a Jungian analyst in private practice in Houston, Texas where he is also Executive Director of the Jung Educational Center and author of numerous books, including "Tracking the Gods: The Place of Myth in Modern Life"; "Creating a Life: Finding your Individual Path"; "Swamplands of the Soul: New Life in Dismal Places"; "The Middle Passage: From Misery to Meaning in Midlife".

Rhoda Isaac, MA was born in New York in 1928. She studied art at the Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, Art Students League, received her BA from the State University New York and her MA from Goddard College, Vermont. She graduated from the CG Jung Institute Zurich in 1980. She is an exhibiting painter and photographer, has been an art teacher in a private school, an art therapist in the Klinik am Zürichberg and has lectured widely on picture interpretation. She now maintains a private practice in Princeton, New Jersey.

Mario Jacoby, PhD, maintains a private analytical practice. He has given lectures and seminars throughout Europe, the USA, South Africa, Latin America and Israel. He is the author of numerous articles and 6 books on Analytical Psychology, among them: "The Analytic Encounter" (Inner City 1984); "Individuation and Narcissism" (Rutledge, 1989); "Shame and the Origins of Self-Esteem" (Routledge 1993); "Jungian Psychotherapy and Contemporary Infant Research" (Routledge 1999).

Waltraut Körner, lic.theol., is a Jungian analyst, a training analyst and maintains a private practice in Zurich. Her special interest is researching the depth psychological background of anti-Semitism. She has held several public lectures and essays on this theme, and has published an article *The Wandering Jew*. Her thesis was the "Animus and His Role in Women's' Liberation", which is still of interest to her. Over the years she has translated Jungian lit-

erature from English to German, especially the works of Marie-Louise von Franz, and recently Jung's *Kundalini Yoga* seminar from 1932.

Shirley Ma, PhD, is the first Chinese-speaking graduate of the CG Jung Institute Zurich. She was a training analyst and faculty member of the Training Program in Toronto and has lectured widely in the USA, Canada, Europe and China. Recently she relocated to Hong Kong where she has set up her analytical practice. Her areas of expertise include trauma and healing, women and work, Mind/Body integration. She has published numerous articles on Analytical Psychology and Chinese culture. Her book, "Bound for Life: The Psyche of Modern Chinese Women", will soon be published.

Inge Missmahl, lic. phil., received degrees in Munich and Tubingen in the social sciences and literature. She trained as a dancer in Paris, London and New York. She is the director of the International Dance and Theater School of Constance. At present she is involved with humanitarian institutes in Afghanistan, Pakistan and Indonesia working with trauma and training people in psycho-social counseling. She maintains a private practice in Constance.

Cedrus Monte, PhD dipl., is a graduate of the CG Jung Institute Zurich, and currently teaches at ISAPZURICH. Her research into synchronicity and the creative process is published in the anthology, Images, Meanings and Connections: Essays in Memory of Susan R. Bach (Daimon 1999), and was funded by the Susan Bach Foundation in Zurich. Her most recent research, also funded by the Susan Bach Foundation, enquires into the relationship between psyche and soma through movement. The article, Numen of the Flesh, discusses the nature of this work (Quadrant, Journal of the C. G. Jung Foundation for Analytical Psychology, Summer 2005). Other publications include The Moonlit Path: Reflections on the Dark Feminine (Nicolas-Hays 2003). She has taught courses in movement in the U.S., Canada and Switzerland. She lives and practices in Zurich.

Bernard Sartorius received his degree in theology in Geneva University in 1965 and worked for several years as a protestant minister, first in a parish and then in youth work. He completed his training at the CG Jung Institute Zurich in 1974, maintaining an analytical private practice first in Geneva and then, since 1997, in Lucerne and Zurich. He is training analyst of ISAPZURICH. His publications include a book about the Orthodox Church and many papers (in *Vouivre*, Lausanne) about various symbolical subjects, such as A Pilgrimage to Mecca.

Murray Stein, PhD, is a training analyst at IS-APZURICH. He is a founding member of the Inter-Regional Society for Jungian Analysts (USA) and the Chicago Society of Jungian Analysts and was president of the International Association for Analytical Psychology from 2001 to 2004. He has written several books, including "Jung's Treatment of Christianity; In MidLife; Transformation – Emergence of the Self; Jung's Map of the Soul". He is the editor of "Jungian Analysis" (Open Court) and a publisher at Chiron Publications, where he has edited the *Chiron Clinical Series*.

Ursula Wirtz, PhD graduated from the University of Munich and received her PhD in clinical psychology from the University of Zurich. She has taught at the Universities of Sarajevo, Dublin and Bonn. She is an anthropological psychologist, Jungian training analyst, and Psychotraumatologist. She has numerous publications on trauma, ethics and spirituality.

Penelope Yungblut, MA trained at the CG Jung Institute Zurich, and is a member of AGAP, ISAP and IRSJA. She maintains a private practice in Bound Hill, VA and Washington DC. She lectures, gives seminars and workshops to various Jungian societies and other groups in the USA as well as ISAPZURICH. Her manuscript entitled "The Path of Devotion: Listening to the Deep Within" has been submitted for publication.

Programs

Diploma Program – ISAP's post-graduate immersion training in Analytical Psychology leads to the Diploma in Analytical Psychology. The Diploma itself can lead to membership in AGAP and the International Association of Analytical Psychology (IAAP). Those who graduate under the Charta-Regulations are qualified to apply for psychotherapy practice licensing in Switzerland.

Continuing Education – For personal and professional development, ISAP opens its regular lectures to the general public, who may attend as auditors without prerequisites or registration. Certificates are offered for attendance of the Jungian Odyssey (annual conference & retreat), and for completion of studies as matriculated auditor in the Theoretical Knowledge in Analytical Psychology (minimum 1 year on campus, with exam requirements).

Counseling Service

Initial consultations for adults, adolescents and children are free of charge, and may lead to referrals to ISAP analysts or diploma candidates for analysis, psychotherapy or other psychological accompaniment in at least 7 different languages.
